Our School Curriculum Intent

The curriculum at Willingdon Community School offers a broad, balanced, personalised and challenging educational experience, which builds on students' experiences in the primary phase of their education.

It aims to provide all students with the knowledge, understanding, skills and attitudes which are necessary if they are to become successful learners who enjoy learning, make progress and achieve the best they are capable of.

Subject Vision

Our priority is for students to reach their potential during their school journey and for this to be reflected in their public examination results. Although students move on from Willingdon Community School for Post 16 Education, we will ensure that students have developed key transferable skills to adapt to their next destination and as confident learners are ready to embrace life to the full.

To demonstrate this commitment we have been awarded, by the Investors in Careers – a nationally recognisable body as 'Fully meeting all the accreditation criteria incorporating the Gatsby Benchmarks' for the National Quality Award for Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance Provision.

Through our comprehensive careers programme which begins in year 7, all students will receive a robust careers curriculum linked to the 8 Gatsby Benchmarks of Good Career Guidance. Students will learn from career and labour market information and experience encounters with employers, employees and different workplaces to ensure that they are Post 16 ready and have knowledge of over 300 different careers.

To ensure students understand the benefits of both further and higher education, we have developed strong links with local and national universities and colleges. All students have the opportunity to visit and gain an understanding of university life and the benefits of achieving a degree. We work closely with many of the local colleges and support students on taster days during Key Stage 4.

A comprehensive work experience programme exists for students in Key Stage 4, providing first hand insights into the world of work and we also welcome different speakers into our school to educate and enthuse students about future careers and the vast range of choices available to them.



Key Concepts in Careers

The careers programme prepares our students for the next stage of their life which might be further education or an apprenticeship. Young people must make well founded decisions based on a range of facts and information, as choosing the next step that is right for them will impact on the options they have later in life.

Our careers education is centred around the following:

- Careers education covering industries, career paths, jobs, self-assessment and subjectspecific career options
- Post 16 choices, 6th Form, colleges and apprenticeships, higher education including types of qualification and their parity
 - > Employer engagement at a local, regional, national and international level
 - Labour market information at a local and national level
 - Personal skills for work embracing self-confidence, being articulate and determined, demonstrating clear aspiration and becoming a fearless learner
 - Employability through developing confidence in the construction professional CVs, covering letters and application forms. Developing work-related experiences that add value and help make our students work-ready.
- > Entrepreneurial skills, aiming to nurture leadership, innovation, resilience, problemsolving and financial awareness.





Programme of Study Key Stage 3

Careers, Employability and Enterprise Education

The Big Future's Careers programme is delivered through Tutor Time, in curriculum areas and through the Enterprise Curriculum at KS3.

The Enterprise Curriculum

These 8-week courses, first introduced in September 2021 reflect the need to make young people world-ready by delivering valuable life skills and knowledge about the wider world; students will gain insight and understanding of the world of Business, Economy and Careers. Money management and aspirations are a focus in Year7 while in Year8 the emphasis moves to understand how and why businesses exist and the roles they create within the labour market. Year 9 has its main focus on entrepreneurship and product development with a project based around McDonald's Educational Resources.

Tutor Time

Developing yourself through careers, employability and enterprise

This covers self-awareness, self-determination and self-improvement in order that learners are aware of their strengths and preferences so that they are able to focus on the positive aspects of wellbeing, progress and achievements.

Learning about careers and the world of work

This explores careers and careers development and investigates work and work life. Students gain an understanding of business and industry and are aware how working lives can change. It also focuses on the vast range of jobs available and labour market information. Equality, diversity and inclusion are explored, along with safe working practices and environments.

Developing career management, employability and enterprise skills

This area ensures that students can make the most of different career information and guidance, so that they can develop employability and enterprise skills. It also allows them to develop their application and financial capability skills, so that they can make informed and sound choices in the future.

University of Sussex at The Keep

We were delighted to welcome back our first Year 10 work experience student since the start of the pandemic. Miller Addems from Willingdon School in Eastbourne joined the University of Sussex team for a week finding out about working with archives. Here is an extract from what Miller wrote after his placement. "I have never once been bored at The Keep as new and exciting things happen every day. "I spent my first day cataloguing pictures of the University of Sussex taken in the 60s and got a great tour of the library on campus. "I met some of the people who work at The Keep and was delighted to see how friendly everyone was. My next day was probably the most eventful of the week. I started the day in the conservator's workshop and could not believe The Keep had a 1680s copy of The Tempest!" After experiencing the tasks a conservator has to do I returned to my desk and began working on cataloguing political books and pamphlets which I very much enjoyed. "Finally I ended the day sitting in on a meeting where a person was donating hundreds of letters from her German Jewish family members to The Keep!"

Parents can help students by: -

Engaging them in effective career conversations and guiding them in making decisions about their future careers. They can also help by helping their child discover their strengths and passions and exposing them to a variety of activities to see what piques their interest.

Discuss their future career ideas and encourage them to think about all the options available.

Encourage them to make full use of the help and guidance available to them at school.

Encourage them to develop their skills through education, hobbies, interests, work experience and part-time jobs.

Encourage them to use websites to look to the future by finding out about the job market, skills employers are looking for and employment trends.
