

Number of vacancies in the UK, seasonally adjusted, March to May 2005 to March to May 2024





Figure 2: In March to May 2024 quarterly growth varied across industry sectors

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Focus on - Early Years funding reforms

Entitlements to free childcare hours are changing, with the new entitlements being introduced in phases:

- from April 2024, all working parents of 2-year-olds can access 15 hours per week.
- from September 2024, all working parents of children aged 9 months up to 3-yearsold can access 15 hours per week.
- from September 2025, all working parents of children aged 9 months up to 3-yearsold can access 30 hours free childcare per week.

This change in entitlement is likely to put pressure on Early Years childcare providers, where nationally there is already a struggle with recruitment and retention in the sector. The Department for Education has taken the following actions to address the issues:

- Regulatory framework changes to staff:child ratios and changing qualification requirements for practitioners. Including the removal of the requirement for some practitioners, beneath manager, to have a level 2 maths qualification.
- National recruitment campaign.
- <u>Financial incentives for new and returning staff</u> (Piloting in 20 local authorities from April to December 2024).
- Early Years Skills Bootcamps.
- Wider investment in training as part of early years education recovery programme.

East Sussex Initiatives

An Early Years working group has been established and is coordinated by Skills East Sussex officers in the Employability and Skills team to look at initiatives to address the skills and employment gaps in the sector. Several key stakeholders are part of the group including the East Sussex County Council Early Years Education team, local course providers, and the DWP. Initiatives being considered:

- Sector-based Work Academy Programme (SWAP)
- A sector spotlight aimed at both job seekers and school and college leavers.
- Discussions with early years providers to gather information on requirements, needs and barriers faced with skills and employability at a local level.
- Myth busting around Universal Credit entitlement.
- Careers campaign initiatives to inspire the impending and next generation of employees.

Skills East Sussex coordinates and supports large number of activities through its <u>sector</u> <u>task groups</u> and beyond. The Sector Task groups include businesses, education providers, job centres and others committed to addressing skills and employability challenges across the county.


Adult Skills Fund (ASF) -September 2024 will see start of the Adult Skills Fund (ASF) replacing the current Adult Education Budget (AEB) The ASF aims to empower adult learners in non-devolved areas by equipping them with skills that lead to meaningful, sustained, and relevant employment. It also supports progression to further learning that aligns with these employment outcomes. Additionally, the ASF offers tailored learning provisions to achieve broader objectives. These include improving health and wellbeing, equipping parents and carers to better support their children's education, and fostering stronger, more resilient communities.
