This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents and carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music outside of lesson time. This includes choirs, ensembles and bands, and enables pupils to make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

School Band – All year groups

Weekly after school sessions open to all year groups. Linked to summer Open Mic outdoor Concert Performance as part of our Phoenix Festival. Develops arranging, song writing and improvising skills. Access to amplifiers, drum kit and electronic drum kits and synths.

Willingdon String Ensemble – All year groups

Open to all string players. Weekly lunchtime school sessions. This ensemble performs in our Christmas Concert and Phoenix Festival and perform a range of repertoire suitable for beginner, intermediate and advanced players.

School Choir – All year groups

Open to all singers in all year groups. This ensemble performs in our Christmas Concert and Phoenix Festival and perform repertoire in a range of styles.

Musical Theatre Group – All year groups

Open to all singers in all year groups. This ensemble stages a Musical annually in the Spring Term.

Smaller Ensembles – All year groups

We have a large number of smaller groups that rehearse on a weekly basis throughout the year in preparation for concerts and performances both inside and outside of the school. This includes a large number of bands and vocal ensembles as well as a variety of instrumental and vocal groups.	

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts, shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Musical events

Willingdon is a musical school and music is a valued part of school life. The annual calendar is rich with popular events and flagship performance opportunities.

We provide opportunities for students to experience live music making in a variety of genres:

Create Music Workshops - September

In September each year, Create Music visit the school to give a demonstration to the Year 7 cohort of the instruments that are available to learn at Willingdon Community School. As part of the presentation, students experience the excitement of seeing and hearing a demonstration of the instruments that are available to learn and are also given an opportunity to 'try out' some of the instruments.

Christmas Concert - End of Autumn Term

Large scale concert comprising of Instrumental and Vocal Solos and Ensembles as well as performances from some of our Rock Bands, Choirs, String Ensemble and Music Theatre Group.

Musical - Spring Term

A Musical is staged each year in the Spring Term, accompanied by an in-house band made up of students.

Phoenix Festival - Summer Term

Large scale outdoor concert in the school grounds featuring instrumental and Vocal Solos and Ensembles as well as performances from some of our Rock Bands, Choirs, String Ensemble and Music Theatre Group.

Smaller Scale Musical events - at various times throughout the year

Smaller scale musical events / performances both inside and outside of school also take place at various times throughout the academic year.

Performances in assemblies

Students perform in assemblies at various times throughout the year both as soloists as well as in ensembles.

Singing assemblies

Singing assemblies take place at various times throughout the year to develop students' singing skills. As part of these assemblies, students are introduced to choral music in a variety of styles and genres.

We are in the process of implementing an exciting and eclectic KS3 music curriculum that better prepares students for GCSE Music. The curriculum focuses on a balance between composition, musical appreciation and performance. The focus remains on engaging all students and fostering a love of music whilst ensuring they are equipped with solid musical foundations should they wish to study the subject at a higher level.

We are also keen to increase the number of students receiving instrumental and vocal lessons by raising awareness of the benefits of learning an instrument through year group workshops and demonstrations in class.
