Young people's creative evaluation of Eastbourne ALIVE - Paid opportunities to get involved!

Eastbourne ALIVE is an exciting programme of activities, events, and public artworks celebrating the Turner Prize 2023 coming to Eastbourne.

The research team leading the evaluation is looking for young people aged 13-25 in Eastbourne who want to get involved in December 2023 and January 2024. As well as getting some interesting experience, finding out about creative opportunities in Eastbourne, and showcasing your own creative skills, you'll receive payment (in the form of vouchers you can use at multiple retailers) for taking part - anything from £10 to £75 depending on your time and level of commitment.

You can get involved by:

- **Producing a creative journal/ scrapbook** This involves recording your own thoughts, feelings, and experiences of Eastbourne ALIVE over 4-8 weeks, using creative methods such as photos, videos, creative writing or poetry, moodboards and mindmaps. You'll receive guidance on what to do and get a £15 voucher for submitting your scrapbook.
- Being a community researcher/ storyteller You'll receive training on how to conduct interviews (using video, photos, audio, or written formats) with other young people in Eastbourne. For each interview you submit (maximum of 6) you'll receive a £10 voucher.



My Book Review by Violet C in Year 9


Warrior Cats, Into the Wild a fantasy book written by Erin Hunter.

What the blurb says:



"For generations, four clans of wild cats have shared the forest according to laws laid down by their ancestors. But the ThunderClan cats are in grave danger as the sinister ShadowClan grows stronger every day. In the midst of this turmoil appears a house cat called Rusty, who may turn out to be the bravest warrior of all."

Set in the New Forest, it follows the main characters as they experience a range of human emotions and personalities. This book is in a series, it is the first book out of 8 series (not including the super editions, graphic novels, mangas and guides). However, I think this book could be better if the map in the front of the book had some work done to it because it didn't look much like the forest. I would recommend that students who like to read books about animals read this series.
