Dear Parents/Carers,

As we approach the Easter break, we'd like to inform you of an important change coming after the holidays. Starting after Easter, our tutor time will be moved to the start of the school day, beginning promptly at **8:30 AM**. This is a crucial part of our school day, and we ask that all students are **on time** so they can fully benefit from this important session.

This week, we were excited to welcome **210 parents** to our community on Tuesday, whose children will be joining us in September. It was a fantastic opportunity to connect and share our vision for the future with these families, and we look forward to working alongside them in the coming months.

I'd also like to take a moment to share some recent successes from our leadership team:

- **Miss Walters** has been doing secondment work for another local school, helping them improve their safeguarding practices. She is now also delivering training for the entire county on safeguarding. We are incredibly fortunate to have such a talented individual on our team.
- **Mr Holt** has been leading the Deputy Head network across East Sussex, recently co-leading a "Sharing Excellence" event with Seaford Head. This event allowed us to collaborate with other schools, share our expertise, and learn from one another.
- **Mrs Townsend-Smith** has been working across schools in the county to support them with behaviour interventions and strategies. Her role in helping schools implement effective behaviour management practices is highly valued. In addition to this, she has been supporting LSEAT (a South East academy chain) in their work with the Pupil Referral Unit, College Central. Her success in these areas speaks to the high regard her colleagues hold her in, particularly for her impactful approach to behaviour. We are proud to have leaders like Mrs Townsend-Smith whose influence extends beyond the gates of Willingdon.
- On a personal note, I continue to support a multi-academy trust in Kent on occasional days. I will be working with them again next week to review certain subject areas and share best practices. This collaboration further enriches our own practice and provides valuable insights for our school.
- I will soon be moving into the role of Chair of Eastbourne Area Group Two, leading school improvement across **nine local schools**. This is an exciting opportunity for me to have an even broader impact on education in the region, and our school will continue to benefit as well as the wider community.

All of this work is invaluable to Willingdon. It ensures that we remain at the forefront of educational excellence, helping us to continuously improve and provide the best possible environment for our students. By collaborating with other schools, we can implement effective change, learn from others, and adopt new ideas that will benefit our students. This also helps us to retain the very best leaders, who are key to ensuring the continued success of Willingdon.

Thank you for your ongoing support. We wish you all a weekend full of sunshine and look forward to welcoming students back Monday morning for the final two weeks of school.

PE Uniform

In the approach to the summer months, we wanted to remind parents, carers and students that we have moved to a **compulsory PE short, for all students**. This is with the aim to standardise and smarten our school PE kit. The Willingdon Community School shorts are available to purchase on ParentPay. *(Initial communication regarding this was circulated in July 2024)*. Any other shorts or skort are no longer permitted as part of the PE kit. If students do not wish to wear the compulsory PE shorts, they should continue to wear their plain black leggings or joggers.

In addition to this, a reminder that **non-uniform tracksuit tops, hooded tops and plain black jumpers, including those with a V neck, are not permitted** as part of the school PE kit and will be confiscated if worn. If students are cold on PE days, the options for layers are:

- Willingdon Community School logoed sweatshirt
- Willingdon Community School logoed zip top
- Plain black or white long sleeved base layer underneath their PE t-shirt
- Their blazer, *which can then be removed once they arrive to their PE lesson.*

We are very proud of the engagement we have in our PE lessons, and do believe part of this is due to removing the barrier of having to change out of uniform. For this to remain in the place, the PE kit policy must be followed.



Changes to Tutor Time

Following feedback from our recent Parent Forums, as well as input from teachers and students, we have decided to move tutor time to the start of the school day. This change will ensure that students are welcomed each morning by a familiar contact, setting them up for a positive day. It will also allow us to check uniform and equipment expectations at the beginning of the day, preventing unnecessary negative conversations later on.

We remain committed to excellent punctuality and are pleased that Stagecoach has responded positively to our request for earlier bus arrival times. Additionally, our tutor programme will continue to cover key areas such as Literacy, Careers, and support for the RSHE programme.

This change will take effect immediately after the Easter break. We will also be returning to a single break time, which will increase the capacity of staffing available to supervise the field, allowing students more space to enjoy during break time. Year 7 students will receive additional transition time built into lessons to support their movement around the school.

Treats with the Team

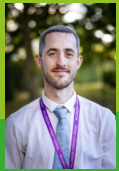

GCSE Revision: How PARENTS Can Help!

Working environment

Your child will spend many hours revising at school, both in normal lessons and during extra revision sessions held after school, but it's the extra time they spend revising independently at home that can make such a big difference.

Ideally, when they are studying at home, they need a permanent, quiet, well-lit place to study with very few interruptions or distractions. The best set up is probably to have a flat surface such as a desk or table in their bedroom. The problem with using other spaces, such as the living room or kitchen, is that they are more likely to be interrupted from their studies.

However, students like to work in different places in different ways and working at a desk or table isn't always possible, practical or even preferable. Instead, some students do like to work in the kitchen or living room or if they do study in their bedroom prefer to lie on their bed rather than sit at a desk.

When studying, they should make sure that the desk or table they are working at is clear of everything except for relevant material and equipment and free from anything that might distract them. It is a good idea for them to get into the habit of tidying up their workspace at the end of each revision session so that it is clear when they start again.

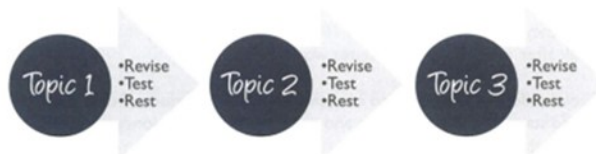
- ✓ Ask your child if they think they have a suitable working environment at home and what you can do to improve things.
- ✓ Make sure that siblings and anyone else in the house are aware that they will need to be extra considerate at this time.
- ✓ If it proves difficult to find a suitable place to revise at home, find out if their school offers quiet spaces before or after school or during lunch breaks.

"Try to make sure they have a quiet place to study at home."

Revise, test, rest

Revision sessions should be kept to a reasonable length and anywhere between 1-3 hours is about right, with regular short breaks. Before starting a revision session, students need to set a definite time to start and finish and stick to it.

An effective revision session follows a pattern of revise, test, rest and might be divided up like this: 40 minutes revising, 10 minutes testing, 10 minutes resting or 20 minutes revising, 5 minutes testing, 5 minutes resting.



Short bursts of revision following this pattern can be useful when students are tired or the topic is difficult or boring. They should always try to end each revision session by summing up or testing.

Many students like to have something to look forward to or some kind of reward after a revision session. This might include spending time on their phone, watching videos or a favourite snack.

- ✓ Offer to help them to structure their revision sessions.
- ✓ Ask if they would like you to help with testing them at the end of revision periods.
- ✓ Buy a cheap digital kitchen timer so that they can keep track of time during revision sessions and take scheduled breaks.

Computer Games Developers create video games for phones, tablets, PCs and consoles.

Routes into the industry

You can get into this job through:

University

You could do a foundation degree or degree in:

- **Computer games technology**
- **Computer games development**
- **Computer science**
- **Interactive media**
- **Mathematics**

If you'd like a job that includes game design as well as programming, you could do a foundation degree or degree in a subject like animation or graphic design. You may have an advantage when you look for work if you do a degree that includes a work placement.

College

You could do a college course before a higher level qualification. It might help you to get a trainee position with a company. Courses you could take include:

- **A level in Computing**
- **T Level in Digital Production, Design and Development**
- **Higher National Diploma in Creative Media Production Games Development**

Apprenticeship

The following apprenticeships can help to get started in this role:

- **Software developer higher apprenticeship**
- **Junior 2D artist higher apprenticeship**
- **Junior vfx artist higher apprenticeship**
- **Game programmer degree apprenticeship**

Work

You could start as a games tester if you play a lot of games. You'll usually need an IT qualification or some relevant work experience. Employers will be interested in your talent and creativity. You may also find it helps to have A levels or a diploma in relevant subjects like computing or media production.

Day to day tasks

- Work in a team with designers and artists.
- Decide what a game will look like and how it can be played.
- Develop your own ideas or work from an existing idea.
- Create concept art, drawings or storyboards at the planning stage.
- Create code to programme the game.
- Test and debug code.
- Use computer modelling and animation software to make characters and scenes.
- Add sound effects.

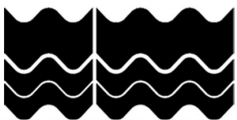
