It is with sadness that we share with you all the death of Miss Dorothy Cummant who taught at Willingdon for many years. Dorothy was 102 when she passed away. Due to the War, Dorothy came into teaching later on in her life, and started at Willingdon when the school first opened in 1956. She taught English and went on to become Deputy Head until her retirement. She was one of the first female Deputy Heads and one of the first single women in the country to be approved a mortgage! Dorothy dedicated her whole life to teaching and whilst she didn't initially have a degree later on in her life gained her first BA and then a MA. Dorothy always retained a strong interest with the school and kept in touch with many ex-pupils over the years.

#### Keeping safe over the summer holidays - advice for students:

We want you to have a thoroughly lovely summer holiday, here is some advice to make sure you keep yourself safe.

#### Out and about:

- 1. Stay alert and keep your attention focused on your surroundings. Avoid using headphones or listening to loud music so that you can hear what's happening around you.
- 2. Stick to well-lit and busy roads, and avoid taking shortcuts through alleyways or secluded areas.
- 3. When using public transportation, try to use bus stops or train stations located on busy roads or in well-populated areas.
- 4. Keep your mobile phone and other valuables out of sight to avoid attracting unnecessary attention.
- 5. Always inform your parents or caregivers about your plans, including where you are going, when you will be there, and when you expect to return home.
- 6. Remember to look both ways and be attentive when crossing the road. Avoid crossing the road while distracted.

#### **Online:**

- 7. Take a moment to review and adjust your privacy settings on social networking sites to ensure that only your friends can see your personal information.
- 8. It's important to take regular breaks from spending time online. Engage in other activities and enjoy the holiday season offline.
- 9. Be mindful of what you post online. Avoid sharing anything that is unkind, inappropriate, or could potentially compromise your safety.

#### Water Safety:

- 10. When near bodies of water, such as pools, rivers, or beaches, always follow safety guidelines and swim with caution. Never swim alone and ensure there is a lifeguard present if possible.
- 11. If you're not a strong swimmer, consider wearing a life jacket or buoyancy aid when participating in water activities.
- 12. Be aware of the signs and dangers of rip currents or strong currents in open water. If caught in a current, swim parallel to the shore until you can safely swim back to land.

#### **Train Line Safety:**

- 13. When using trains or railways, always stand behind the yellow line on platforms and wait for the train to come to a complete stop before boarding or disembarking.
- 14. If traveling alone, choose seats or compartments that are near other families or groups of people.
- 15. Don't trespass on train tracks or walking along railway lines. Trains can approach silently and at high speeds, making it dangerous to be near the tracks.

#### **Year 11 college applications**

Further to the recent year 10 taster days, I am writing with regards to the college application process that will start in September.

At Willingdon Community School, we use a college application programme called 'Careers East Sussex'. In September, students will start the process of adding their personal profile to the system as well as adding their personal statement that they have been working on during English lessons, details of their work experience, and their predicted grades. We aim to have this part of the application process completed by **Friday, 25**<sup>th</sup> **October 2024** so that students can then complete and submit their college applications.

If they have not already done so, please could your child consider the courses that they would like to study at college during the summer break. Please see the below web links with the list of courses at the local colleges.

In addition, I have attached two documents; one which explains the various types of courses on offer at the colleges and the other that lists the grades/entry requirements necessary.

When we return to school in September, it may be that your child is still considering which A levels to take or that they are undecided if they want to apply for a T Level/BTEC instead. Students can apply for a variety of courses and have interviews on all of them before deciding. For example, if your child is undecided which three A levels they want to choose, they can choose four or five and discuss them at interview stage. Alternatively, if your child would like an interview for A levels, but would also like to consider a T Level, they can add all the courses of interest and discuss them further at their interview.

If your child is unsure of the college that they would like to attend, they can apply for as many colleges as they wish and have interviews at all of them.

#### **POST-16 OPTIONS**

- A-levels A-levels normally take two years to complete, full-time and are at Level 3 on the National Qualifications Framework (NQF). Students usually take A-level qualifications in Year 12 and 13, after completing their GCSEs. They would usually need at least five GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 to be able to study them. Some colleges require you to have grade 4 or above in English and maths, or grade 5 or above in the subject you want to take. You usually choose the A-levels that you wish to study in Year 11, but you do have the chance to change your choices after receiving your GCSE results or after a week or so of the course if it is not what you expected. There is a wide range of around 80 subjects available, although exact courses on offer will change depending on the college or sixth form you choose. Subjects are mainly academic, but there are also some 'applied' subjects, which are more career focused.
- BTECs BTECs are vocational, work-related qualifications that aim to engage and inspire learners in a wide range of subjects. BTEC Nationals are Level 3 courses (there are also Level 2 courses, which are the same level as GCSE) that are usually studied full -time at college. The content of your course and the knowledge you will gain depends on the subject you choose. The aim of a BTEC is to develop skills that apply to the workplace and will be beneficial for the future, and so your learning will be tailored around the specific sector you are studying. BTECs develop more practical knowledge and provide a different approach to learning, based alongside a theoretical background.
- T Levels these 2-year courses have been developed in collaboration with employers and businesses to prepare students for work. T Levels will offer students a mixture of classroom learning and 'on-the-job' experience during an industry placement of at least 315 hours (approximately 45 days). They will provide the knowledge and experience needed to open the door into skilled employment, further study or a higher apprenticeship.
- Apprenticeships An apprenticeship gives a combination of on-the-job training with study (usually one day a week) meaning you can earn while you learn. With some apprenticeships you can even get a degree. It usually takes between one and four years to complete an apprenticeship depending on which level you take. Apprenticeships are available across a wide range of industries and many high-quality, prestigious companies offer them.
- Traineeships a traineeship is an education and training programme with work experience that unlocks the great potential of young people and prepares them for their future careers by helping them to become 'work ready'. Designed to help young people aged 16 to 24 who don't yet have the appropriate skills or experience, traineeships provide the essential work preparation training, English, maths and work experience needed to secure an apprenticeship or employment.
