

# Pupil Premium

## 2019-20 spending & planned strategy for 2020 21



The Pupil Premium Grant is an additional sum of money paid to all schools in order to tackle educational disadvantage resulting from low income or family circumstance. The money schools receive for Pupil Premium students must be used to address disadvantage or improve outcomes for disadvantaged students. The amount is calculated on the number of students on roll who are currently eligible for free school meals or have been eligible within the last six years (*Ever 6*), children looked after in local authority care and those adopted from care and children who have a parent in the armed forces. The grant allows us to address inequality and provide for the students who need it most. The government allows schools to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent since we are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual students in this setting.

The figure, per student, for the year was £935 for students who have been eligible for free school meals in the last six years and £1900 for children looked after in local authority care. Those who have been adopted from care under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 and those who have left care under a Special Guardianship or Residence Order have a sum of £1,900. Finally, students whose parents are in military service have a sum of £300.

## How do we intend to spend our Pupil Premium Grant 2020-21 and how will it have an impact?

### Key Priorities for 2020 to 2021

Following the period of extended school closure in 2019 to 2020, our priorities have shifted this academic year. We four main areas where our fund will be diverted towards to ensure best provision is made for our Pupil Premium students.

### **Attendance**

We recognise that for some of our students attendance is a barrier. We have therefore invested in staffing to support students achieve and maintain excellent attendance.

### **Alternative Provision**

The school environment and new national curriculum does not meet the needs of all of our students. In some cases, we have funded alternative provisions to support our learners in an environment which allows them to flourish.

### **Mental Health**

One barrier to our students is mental health. For some students this has been exacerbated by lockdown. We have a school counsellor and a school welfare office to support these students. We also are investing in Mindfulness sessions with a qualified practitioner.

### **Access To Quality T&L, Including Access To Technology**

Research indicates one of the most effective methods to close the gap between disadvantaged students and their peers is through high quality teaching and learning. We have therefore invested in our in-house CPD programme and our Progress Every Lesson teaching and

learning agenda. In light of the new way of working for students, to support their access to teaching and learning we have invested in ensuring all of our disadvantaged students have access to technology. This will enable them to access live learning in lockdown and access additional interventions beyond school
